## FIREWORKS SAFETY: FIRE AND INJURY STATISTICS

Each July 4th, thousands of people, most often children and teens, are injured while using and handling consumer fireworks.

Despite the dangers of fireworks, very few people understand the associated risks of overlooking fireworks safety. In 2017, there was a report of:



12,900 fireworks related injuries/burns



\$43 million in direct property fire damage



Average of 3 deaths each year

Fireworks start an avg. of 18,500 fires per year:



1,300 Structure fires



vehicle fires



16,900 outside fires

Obey all local laws regarding the use of fireworks.

Read the cautionary labels and performance descriptions before igniting.

Wear safety glasses when shooting fireworks.

Use fireworks outdoors in a clear area; away from buildings and vehicles.

Never relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and then soak it in a bucket of water.

Dispose of spent fireworks by wetting them and place in a metal can away from any building or combustible materials until the next day.

A responsible adult should supervise all firework activities.

Have a water and charged water hose nearby.
